PROGRESS REPORT 2019/2020

YOUTH GOVERNMENTAL STRUCTURE

- My main goal was to create a structure that continued to move forward. I felt in order to bring confidence back to the program, we needed to give our youth the ability to have ownership in their program.
 - Building a program that was sustainable and had substance was the start of putting this youth program back on track.
 - The first step was to make sure that the youth program had the right youth leadership in place.
 - The creation of a Junior Officers Board was the next step,
 - It starts with sustainability by creating a mentoring program so that they can learn from the Senior Officers,
 - The Junior Officers are hopeful to someday become Senior Officers,
 - Our Area Directors are the backbone of the success of the NYCHA. It was critical to get them more involved
 - The 2019/2020 Youth Board consisted of;
 - Senior and Junior President, President-Elect (newly adopted), Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, Reporter and 26 Area Directors
 - Sustainability meant changing our leadership structure. The reason that this program had no sustainability was because the youth board was new every year.
 - The creation of a President-Elect position and the Vice President gave us
 3 years of continued sustainability,
 - For the first time, the NYCHA Youth Program had established by-laws and passed them.

COMMUNICATION

- Communication is essential for the success of the organization.
 - The NYCHA social media was rarely used. This caused parents and youth to be discouraged with the NCHA,
 - Today, social media and distribution emails keeps the entire membership up to date with all NYCHA events, shows and other important items,
 - The NYCHA Monthly Newsletter was created.
 - ➤ All Officers and Area Directors were responsible for getting information out in a timely fashion.
 - The Senior Youth President and the Sr/Jr Reports are responsible for articles for the Chatter,

➤ The Chatter is always 6 weeks from publication, which is why the monthly newsletter was created

FINANCIAL

- My goal is to reach \$1,00,000 by the time I retire so that NYCHA no longer has to rely on asking sponsors every year for money. For example, if we made 7% return on our investments, we could have \$70,000 a year. Today, NCHA pays for all Awards and Trophies and the NCHA Foundation pays for all scholarships related to the Eastern Nationals, Western Nationals, World Finals, Scholarship Cutting and some youth events. Money earned from interest and aged out money from the NCHA Scholarship Fund offsets some of these scholarship costs. In time the NYCHA youth program will be financially stable, through additional money from fundraisers like the Trainers Auction, Stallion Auction, Raffles and Donors.

NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL RODEO ASSOCIATION

On Tuesday November 12, 2019, I had a meeting with James Higginbotham, the Executive Director and Chanel Schvaneveldt, Vice President for Marketing of the National High School Rodeo Association to discuss how the NHSRA and the NCHA/NYCHA can work together so that both organizations can benefit from one another.

Some of the items that were discussed:

- What it would take to have a formal relationship with every state high school rodeo association and the NCHA affiliates. That way there would be more opportunities for rodeo competitors and cutters to qualify for State and Nationals.
 - This would also increase membership for the NYCHA and for the NHSRA.
- As we know, there are NYCHA Members that compete for the all-round, which means that they must be involved in another rodeo class, thereby increasing NHSRA participation from the NYCHA.
- We have 166 NYCHA and NHSRA Members that carry dual membership
- The NYCHA plans on being more proactive in supporting our members at other equine, ranching, and farming organizations at a national level with Judges Clinics, Cutting Clinics, Educational and Leadership Classes and Scholarship opportunities.
- Shared educational and leadership programs.

- Both James and Chanel were interested in having their members participate in our future development of the NYCHA educational and leadership classes.
- The NYCHA and the NHSRA supporting each other's Conventions or National functions. NYCHA Officers and Directors would be more involved in the NHSRA Conventions as the NHSRA Officers would attend the NYCHA Convention and/or seminars.
- Chanel wanted the NYCHA National Senior Officers to be in contact with the NHSRA Officers to discuss a membership drive that would benefit both organizations.
 - I bought up that any youth that would be an active member in good standing with the NYCHA would qualify for scholarship opportunities through the NCHA Foundation.
 - The 2020/2021 Senior Officers and Senior Regional Directors will be tasked with creating a membership drive.

Today, there are 700,170 FFA members, age 12-21, in 8,612 chapters in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. FFA members are in grades seven through 12 and college.
 - The 4-H organization has over 6.5 million members in the United States. Members are five to 19 years old, in approximately 90,000 clubs. The goal of 4-H is to develop citizenship, leadership, responsibility, and life skills of youth through learning programs and positive youth development approach.
 - The National High School Rodeo Association is one of the fastest growing youth organizations, with an annual membership of approximately 12,500 students from 43 states, five Canadian provinces, Australia, and Mexico. The Association sanctions over 1,800 rodeos each year. The NHSRA is governed by a national Board of Directors, which consists of one member from each state or province.
